## Patriotic Pets: Keeping Furry Friends Safe During July 4th Festivities

Pet sitters offer safety tips to pet parents

June 14, 2011 – As July 4<sup>th</sup> quickly approaches, individuals are preparing to gather with friends, family and neighbors – and, of course, their furry friends – for festivities and fireworks. While July 4<sup>th</sup> can be an oasis of relaxation with loved ones, the day presents many serious risks to pets. To help families celebrate safely, the National Association of Professional Pet Sitters (NAPPS) is providing tips and recommendations for a pet-friendly day.

"July 4<sup>th</sup> is a wonderful opportunity to spend quality time with humans and pets alike," explained John D'Ariano, President of the National Association of Professional Pet Sitters. "Pet parents might think letting their pet eat or do things 'once in a blue moon' isn't harmful, but in fact, small actions can cause serious injury. It's vitally important for pet parents to take proper precautions to ensure a smooth and worry-free holiday."

NAPPS recommends the following guidelines to keep pets healthy and safe throughout the July 4<sup>th</sup> holiday.

## Don't:

- Never leave alcoholic beverages unattended around pets.
- Glowing holiday ornaments may seem harmless, but consumption can cause intestinal irritation and blockage if the substance and plastic is swallowed. Do not let your pet wear the ornaments or chew on them.
- Pet parents may take a break from their diet on holidays, but pets cannot. Keep the burgers and hot dogs away to avoid causing your pet indigestion.
- Don't leave your pet out for the grand finale this Fourth of July. The loud noises fireworks make can disturb your pets and if close enough, could injure them. Keep pets indoors at home in a quiet area during fireworks ceremonies. The loud noises can cause trauma, so consider leaving a television or radio on to provide familiar noises while you're attending Fourth of July picnics, parades, and other celebrations. If you know that the pet is seriously distressed by loud noises like thunder, consult with your veterinarian for ways to help alleviate fear and anxiety during fireworks displays.

## Do:

- Make sure pets are wearing identification tags or are microchipped so that if they do become lost, they can be returned promptly.
- Make sure the sunscreen and insect repellant you use on your pet is "animal friendly."
- Keep citronella candles or any other oils out of reach of your pet, as ingesting these can cause stomach irritation.
- If traveling over the July 4<sup>th</sup> holiday, consider hiring a professional pet sitter to care for your pet daily and maintain a proper diet and exercise routines in your absence.

To assist pet parents in the process of finding a professional pet sitter, NAPPS offers the following recommendations:

- Develop a set of questions and conduct a thorough interview
- Ask for multiple references
- Request proof of bonding and liability insurance coverage
- Make sure he/she interacts well with your pet
